| Program Objectives | |
| The goal of the film studies program is to prepare a highly qualified professional who is equipped with systematic knowledge of the history, theory, practical aspects and modern trends of the world and Georgian cinema, the ability to interpret and criticize films in depth, and is able to independently conduct research in the field of film studies using appropriate conceptual approaches and methods. | |

Based on the specifics of the learning components, other methods of teaching, present in the syllabus of specific courses, may also be used in the process of implementing the program.

Program structure

The program consists of 120 credits, which are distributed as follows:

- Compulsory courses CINCINGEN- 54 credits;
- Compulsory-elective courses CINCIN- 30 credits;
- Elective course from any master's program - 6credits
- Master's Thesis, code CINCINGEN -30 credits

Assessment system

Assessment is based on a 100 point system. Points will be distributed and defined as follows:

- (A) Excellent – 91-100 points;
- (B) Very good – 81-90 points;
- (C) Good – 71-80 points;
- (D) Satisfactory – 61-70 points;
- (E) Sufficient – 51-60 points.
- (FX) Didn't Pass – 41-50 points, which means that the student needs to work more and is allowed to retake the exam once by working independently;
- (F) Fail – 40 points and less of the maximum grade, which means that the work done by the student is not enough and he/she has to retake the course.

Note: *Assessment components, benchmarks, assessment criteria and their relative share are presented in the course syllabi.*
