Program Aims	
<p>The purpose of the program is to introduce students to the main characteristics of the native language and literature and to give them a broad and general knowledge of Georgian philology, the grammatical structure of the Georgian language, and the main events of Georgian literature;</p> <p>To teach them the morphology and syntax of the Georgian language, the history of Georgian literature, literary processes and important texts.</p> <p>The program enables students to develop such transferable skills as written and oral communication, reasoning and critical analysis, individual and team work</p>

<p>Upon completion of the program, the graduate has/can:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. describe the basic issues of the structure and functioning of the Georgian language; 2. theoretically convey the basic issues of the morphology and syntax of the Georgian language and practically analyze the relevant language material; 3. knowledge of field-related terminology; 4. demonstrate knowledge of the foundations and principles of literary studies; knows the main aspects of literary theory and the history of Georgian literature; 5. the ability to read, analyze and interpret a literary text; 6. contextualize Georgian literature, connect it with historical-political, cultural and social processes; 7. analyze literary texts based on the principles of tolerance; show respect for Georgian and other languages; 8. practically use information and communication technologies, library and electronic resources when needed; acts in compliance with the principles of individual and team work, considering the norms of academic integrity.

Assessment System

100-point Assessment System defined as follows:
 (A) Excellent – 91-100 points;
 (B) Very good – 81-90 points;
 (C) Good – 71-80 points;
 (D) Satisfactory – 61-70 points;
 (E) Sufficient – 51-60 points;
 (FX) Didn't Pass – 41-50 points, which means that a student needs to work more and is allowed to resit the exam once by working independently;
 (F) Failed – 40 and less points of maximum evaluation, which means that the work done by the student is not enough and he/she has to retake the course.
